SLAVES IN DOWNTOWN TORONTO

On Pesach we recited the Haggadah, and said, "We were slaves in Egypt....". The objective of this statement was not simply to remind us of the persecution perpetrated against the Jewish people but to teach us a valuable lesson.

Passover, we stated that our arms and legs were shackled and our children forced to do slave labour that we be aware of where we came from and the gift and responsibilities that come with our liberation and freedom.

The Haggadah and this concept were mimicked by the late Martin Luther King who stated in his "I have a dream" speech, 'Let freedom ring, ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, so we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children - black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics - will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual: "Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!" '

Fellow Habonim members, we are free. In fact we are perhaps freer than any nation has ever been - able to express our way, our attitude; able to criticize those who manage our land, able to walk and talk where we please, when we please and mostly how we please.

But this year, a year in which the world will commemorate the 200th anniversary of the abolition of the transatlantic slave trade, more than 12 million men, women and children remain shackled to the doorpost of slavery, grimly and gravely suffering like we did in Egypt.

The slaves we speak of are found in Sudan and Mauritania. Boys and girls, men and women are forced to slog in the rug loom sheds of Nepal, sell their bodies in the brothels of Rome, smash rocks in the pits of Pakistan, and fight wars in the jungles of Africa.

But these countries are far enough away on the face of the spinning globe to allow us the justification of 'see not'.

However, when we look in our own backyards, when we dig deeply behind the façade of our splendid city, we find sweatshops and parlours where women are objectified, turned into numbers and resources, and made to work long hours for minimal wages, money that they return to their 'task masters' as rent to live in dingy room.

This is a tough thing to know because it forces us to ask, 'if I were there, what would I have done'. The truth be told, we are 'there'.

'There' is moments away from the comfort of our

homes, where people are forced to do labour and perform sexually against their will; confined, detained and prevented from seeing their families and living freely as we do. They are only moments away!

As many as 800,000 people are trafficked across international borders annually. Sadly, articles were recently published on a slave trade in Israel, where up to 3,000 women have been smuggled into our Homeland and forced to prostitute themselves, and thousands of foreign workers subjugated to a life of slavery and humiliation.

The text of a United Nations resolution in late 2006 recognized "the slave trade and slavery as among the worst violations of human rights in the history of humanity, bearing in mind, particularly, the scale, duration and lingering impact." It documented that slavery is at the heart of "profound social and economic inequality, hatred, bigotry, racism and prejudice."

We as Jewish Canadians therefore need to do the following:

- a) Recognize that slaves contributed to building this country. Do so by urging our government to clearly state our complete history and officially recognize the injustices we perpetrated through participation in slavery (In 1806, York legislator Peter Russell advertised in the York Gazette the sale of his slave Peggy and her son Jupiter.). This will help cleanse our national soul (read Dr. Afua Cooper's book *The Hanging of Angelique: The Untold Story of Canadian Slavery and the Burning of Old Montréal*).
- b) Compel our mayor and city council to liberate all men, women and children working in sweatshops in the Greater Toronto Area, and by extension, throughout Canada;
- c) Challenge the State of Israel to use the full weight of the law to halt the ghastly practice of slavery and the suppression of the rights of migrant workers;
- d) Launch a Tikun Olam (Social Action) committee at

What is a shul without active compassion for those who are suffering, for those who are slaves? It is a building with walls and song. At the centre of the Jewish soul, however, is the celebration of bravery and activism. We know this because we recognize with pride those who fight on behalf of the Jewish people and the State of Israel; those who battled in the Warsaw Uprising...we recognize courage and fighting 'a good fight' as important Jewish character traits.

Today, our brothers and sisters, there are slaves in downtown Toronto. As long as there are, as long as people are chained to one another like oxen in a field, the truth be told - we are slaves too. Fight the fight. It is Jewish.
