HABONIM INTERNATIONAL DOCUMENTARY FILM FESTIVAL

Film to be screened: *Leaving the Fold*

Date: Sunday, September 13th, time: 8:00pm

Place: Congregation Habonim, 5 Glen Park Avenue

Leaving the Fold is a documentary film which tells the story of five young people born and raised within the ultra-Orthodox Jewish world who no longer wish to remain on the inside. As children, they grew up in a closed society where deviation from the rules of conduct is often punishable by ostracism, intimidation or worse. As young adults, they pay a steep price for abandoning their parents and community to seek the freedom to make their own choices.

From the Hasidic enclaves of Montreal, Brooklyn and Jerusalem come stories of conflict, coercion and struggle. Tinged with pain and unexpected humor, *Leaving the Fold* documents the process by which our five heroes emerged from a strictly controlled

society into a baffling secular world of endless choices: What should I wear? What shall I become? Who will I marry? Once everything was decided for them. Now they must decide for themselves. But the answers don't always come easily.

Each month, starting in September, we will be screening a very interesting documentary movie that will be followed by a panel discussion. In each case the panel will consist of relevant experts, hopefully the film's director and others with intimate knowledge and experience of the subject.

Dates will be confirmed soon, as will the titles of the films to be screened.

SO WHAT'S THE BIG SPIRITUAL DEAL?

It's the New Year once again. What does one say with the onset of this season that hasn't been said? What, at this point, is the spiritual big deal about the High Holidays?

This year you will once again review your actions. In the Jewish month when the High Holidays occur you will once more set a personal path for the next twelve months. No doubt you will consider how you have acted toward those you love and think about how you behaved toward those you don't know – like the gas station attendant or the waitress.

It's *Rosh Hashanah* when the gates of heavens swing open bidding welcome to those who have come to

the end of their days. *Who shall live and who shall die?*

It's *Yom Kippur*, this according to Judaism, is the holiest moment of the year when we adorn ourselves with white garb, remove our shoes, refrain from sexual intimacy, deprive ourselves of nutrition; the only sense allowed according to Judaism is that of smell – hence the inevitable bottle of smelling salts that makes its rounds in the synagogues. We hear the words of the *ba'al tefillah* – the one who leads us in prayer – *Al Chait She'chetanu*, a liturgical reference to the sins we have committed.

But what is the big spiritual deal? If we are thirty, this is our thirtieth year in shul; if we are sixty, how different can the service be after three score; how different can it be after three score and ten? What in essence are we doing differently in 5770?

The difference, I believe, is not found in the words of the prayer book or the tune of the ominously sung *Kol Nidre* on the eve of Yom Kippur. It is not necessarily in the message of the speakers – who generally focus on introspection and forgiveness.

The difference this year, in 5770 over last year, the year before, and the one ten years before - is you!

We all know or at least have a sense of who we are today versus yesterday. We have a gut sense about whether we're a better person now, than we were last year. We just know. We just know.

I know that I am more withdrawn on the eve of 5770 than I was at this same time two years ago, and more at ease one year and a bit after suffering a heart attack.

This High Holiday season is different because I am different; I am a man who has not stayed the same, as you have not, and my spiritual bucket is sometimes tilted so that goodness pours in and sometimes pours out.

So what's the big spiritual deal? You. Settle into that reality bravely, and look very closely at how you are different. Find a quiet spot at dusk, and look at yourself.

Prepare for the few hours you will spend in shul, prepare well - so that when the moment comes and you are standing before God, or standing before your shadow – you'll be ready.

Make it good, really good. Wonder, question, query, speculate, conjecture and ask. Ask others how you've done, who you are, and ask yourself while looking in the mirror – am I better?

Intend to study yourself. How do you want to be different. Do you have ideas about your relationship to the person you love the most; to all the others; to God? Are you humble enough to ask forgiveness, and are you able to recognize the things you have done that are right and the things that are wrong? Do you intend to be a better person?

These High Holidays are different because your skin has been shed since last year, your mind has changed and your soul has grown, or perhaps not. Know this and be there, in shul, when you are there.

COMMUNITY SERVICE IN INDIA - HABONIM MEMBER SANDRA VADASZ AMONG GROUP

This summer, a group of five Israelis and five Jewish Canadians traveled to India to volunteer with various community service organizations. Organized by IsraAID & Hillel Israel, the students are providing humanitarian aid in conjunction with the 130,000 strong exiled Tibetan community in Dharmsala.

The students are working in a variety of Tibetan institutions in India - health clinics, old-age homes, schools and more.

They are participating in an HIV/AIDS awareness initiative, working as teachers in the Tibetan Women's Association program Stitches for Tibet, where women are taught how to sew traditional Tibetan clothing, and are provided with health care, English lessons and a small weekly stipend.

Sandra Vadasz, whose family belongs to Congregation Habonim, was brought to tears on her first day of work. She posted this realization on the blog about life there: "I am often so busy I don't get

a chance to eat sitting down. Everything is so fast-paced it's hard to look around and observe the world. In fact, sometimes it's difficult to find a moment in the day to breathe!"

Vadasz's job is in the health clinic of an organization called Tibet Charity India. She is working alongside the head nurse, who serves as "doctor, teacher, mother, psychiatrist and friend, among other things, to the elderly."

She says that there are no doctors or prescription medicine, and the head nurse handpicks children from the community to become nurses, training them herself.

It really seems that only a few days into her trip, Vadasz's hope for the trip has been fulfilled. "My view was that this is four weeks of my whole life that will impact me more than one year at home," she says.

The travelers began their trip in Tel Aviv, where they spent a week participating in orientations with their Israeli counterparts, volunteering with organizations such as City Tree that focus on sustainable development, and meeting with Canadian and Israeli diplomats.

From there, the team continued on to India and will spend four weeks there.

Various organizations both in Toronto and in Israel, including The UJA Federation of Greater Toronto, IsraAID, the Israel Forum for International Humanitarian Aid, the Israeli Friends of the Tibetan People, and Hillel of Greater Toronto, joined forces to help make this program possible.
